The Council of the City of Cortland met in regular session on Monday, April 18, 2016 at 7:00 p.m. at the City Administration Building, 400 N High St, Cortland, Ohio with Council President Dennis Linville presiding. Members of Council present were James Edwards, Patti Keller, Don Moore, Kevin Piros, and Scott Rowley; absent was Deidre Petrosky. Also present at the meeting were Mayor Woofter, Law Director Wilson, Finance Director Moyer, Fire Chief Rea, Police Chief Andrews, Service Director Wittman and Clerk of Council Horn.

**MAYOR WOOFER** – The reason we are doing this is anytime property is annexed in, and in this case it was the Evelyn's property south of town here, it changes our borders. The borders have to be petitioned to extend our city borders.

**COUNCILMAN MOORE** – It looks like the quote there is per pallet and it looks like you need three pallets? Is that what that is for Don?

**SERVICE DIRECTOR WITTMAN** – Correct. 2,400 pounds per pallet

**ORDINANCE O-24-16** – An Ordinance repealing O-05-13 and abolishing the Police Reserve Unit in the City of Cortland, Ohio was read and moved for first reading by Councilman Edwards seconded by Councilman Moore.

**POLICE CHIEF ANDREWS** – There is nothing really controversial or problematic with this. It is mostly housekeeping. We have been looking at it for some time now. We are just not able to get candidates that will fill this position. Right now we have no reserve officers on staff so this is a good time to do this as well. Secondly, with the change of our budget recently, we've been able to attract people to come in and work part time for us. So, we can say we want people with some amount of experience and we can fast track them in a

month by actually having them work 3 or 4 shifts a week at various times. It has worked out very well. The one that really prompted this so quickly is the State through Senate Bill 11, which will become law here this month, which required the Volunteer Police Officer's Dependents Fund. It requires anyone that uses reserve or auxiliary police officers to create a 5 person panel which would be some of you, some of us, and some from the community to oversee some of this. We would have to put up funds that would go to the State which weren't exorbitant and not a bad idea. It would be used to cover those injured officers or have been killed in the line of duty. If you remember about two years back, there was a Willoughby officer that was killed in the line of duty. He was out just directing traffic and working, not anything strange. He was run over and killed. He was a reserve officer for them. Basically, they found out he is not covered under worker's comp. There are a lot of other loop holes that were found out. The system could have been more easily fixed than what the legislators put down, but nonetheless for us it prompted the issue to abolish this. We are not getting good candidates, I don't know if it's a millennial thing or what, but it just has not worked out as it has in the past. Most of us came up through that way.

**COUNCILWOMAN KELLER** - We don't use them now?

**POLICE CHIEF ANDREWS** – No.

**COUNCILWOMAN KELLER** – Have we in the past?

**POLICE CHIEF ANDREWS** – We have in the past because we had a good system that worked. They are academy trained. They have full police powers. They have to work 24 hours per month for us free. So we used them a lot for like the Easter Egg Hunts and things like that. They also go out and work on their own once they're trained. The concept usually worked out great because you would get someone just out of the academy and they would work for us free and in return they would learn the trade and be an apprentice. It was much more marketable for them down the road. In a year or two a lot of these people who weren't any good went to other departments because we didn't hire them. That's not a bad system at all. The last 3 or 4 years that has really dwindled down. Not only for us but everybody. I talked to Chief Hovis and some other people and they are looking at doing this exact same thing. They are not getting the candidates either. It's a little bit easier to find someone that already has one or two years of experience somewhere and isn't necessarily happy with their agency or wants to move on. Our wage, like we talked about last year, is making us much more competitive so that should not be a problem. Now we have 6 part time police officers; by ordinance we can have 7.

**COUNCILMAN MOORE** – If circumstances change, could we reestablish it in the future by a new ordinance?

**POLICE CHIEF ANDREWS** - Yes. No problem. We could bring that back on but like I said the only problem we would have is to fulfill the requirements because of this new law. It's not just me. When I went to a chief's meeting recently no one else had heard of this either. It is getting very fast tracked. It was just in the House and Senate as of last year, for that to move that quickly and become law. It's a good idea, just bureaucratically thought out more than realistically.

**MAYOR'S APPOINTMENT TO THE PLANNING, ZONING, AND BUILDING COMMISSION:**

**Curt Moll      Planning, Zoning & Building Commission      Term expiring 12-31-18**

**MAYOR WOOFER** – As you know recently we had a Parks Board member resign.

**LAW DIRECTOR WILSON** – It was the Planning and Zoning Board, Mayor.

**MAYOR WOOFER** – I'm sorry, the Planning and Zoning Commission. I met with the Parks Board tonight so I had them on my mind.

**SERVICE DIRECTOR WITTMAN** - Plus, John did start on the Parks Board.

**MAYOR WOOFER** – He did. That's right. So, John Picuri turned in his resignation which you have all seen in your packets. I gave Curt a call immediately. He had indicated to me earlier this year after he had retired as Mayor, that he would like to be involved again in the city and if the opportunity on the Planning Zoning and Building Commission ever presented itself he would consider it. He did. He accepted it so I would like to ask that you would give him a nomination and second and vote on him for the Zoning Board. His term would expire on December 31, 2018.

**A motion to approve the Mayor's Appointment of Curt Moll was made by Councilman Piros and seconded by Councilman Rowley. ROLL CALL - Edwards, aye; Keller, aye; Linville, aye; Moore, aye; Petrosky, absent; Piros, aye; Rowley, aye. MOTION PASSED**

**MAYOR WOOFER** – Thank you.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT LINVILLE** - Good choice, Mayor.

**MAYOR'S REPORT:**

**MAYOR WOOFER** – I just wanted to welcome our students here tonight. If you happen to miss anything, later on this evening in a few hours you will be able to go to our city's website [cityofcortland.org](http://cityofcortland.org) and there will be a link on there unless we run into any type of issues, where you can review the council meeting on You Tube. I don't want to steal anyone's thunder here, but Don, did we finish brush chipping on the south section today?

**SERVICE DIRECTOR WITTMAN** - I believe so. I saw the truck out. I'm presuming they got it completed today.

**MAYOR WOOFER** – The Scrap Tire Program is also Don's thing but since I brought it up last time, the drop off is at Willow Park – April 11<sup>th</sup> to May 6<sup>th</sup> - Monday through Friday 7 am to 3:30 pm at the City Service Garage. Are we well under way on that, Don?

**SERVICE DIRECTOR WITTMAN** - I did receive a call today. We do not have anyone there to help unload the tires unless you are there around lunch time, or 3:00 p.m., or say 9:00 a.m. which are break times. The caller wanted to know where to drop off the tire. You can actually just drive inside and put them where they were stacked them up against the fence.

**MAYOR WOOFER** – Tom, are you going to talk about Got Drugs?

**POLICE CHIEF ANDREWS** – Yes.

**MAYOR WOOFER** – And Don, are you going to talk about Spring Clean Up?

**SERVICE DIRECTOR WITTMAN** - No.

**MAYOR WOOFER** – Spring Clean Up is May 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> – Please remember to put out your items with your regular trash. Tom, are you going to talk about the Great American Clean Up?

**POLICE CHIEF ANDREWS** – Yes.

**MAYOR WOOFER** – The first mosquito spraying will be May 12<sup>th</sup>, weather permitting. Also, one other item we added to our city website if anyone is interested in knowing what our ordinances are about open burning. You may go to our website and click on that link. It's on the homepage.

**SERVICE DIRECTOR WITTMAN** - While you're on that I'll steal your thunder. To publicize what is new on the website, is we included a public notice page. So that will be either city public notices of hearings coming up, Planning and Zoning, Council, also notices we may receive from the EPA as far as that they are giving us permit renewals that are around the area. As well as any public notices we do for bidding projects or legal advertisements.

**COUNCILMAN ROWLEY** – Don, is the garage sale policy on there? I don't remember. I saw something on-line the other day. People were talking about garage sale permits and how many they were allowed to have.

**COUNCILWOMAN KELLER** -I saw that too. And how many people don't even get them.

(MULTIPLE CONVERSATIONS)

**SERVICE DIRECTOR WITTMAN** – Essentially you can have 2 garage sales a year 3 months apart.

**COUNCILMAN ROWLEY** – But you are required to have a permit though right?

**SERVICE DIRECTOR WITTMAN** – Correct.

**COUNCILMAN ROWLEY** - That was kind of the gist of it; that they didn't know they needed a permit for it.

**MAYOR WOOFER** – If they don't have access to a computer, or they don't have the patience to go on and look for it, have them call city hall.

**COUNCILMAN ROWLEY** - Well, they were on Facebook so I think they have access.

**COUNCLWOMAN KELLER** - I saw that too. One of them said I've had a garage sale every year for 12 years and never had a permit, which made we wonder do we check.

**MAYOR WOOFER** – Pretty much the obvious thing is just give us a call. We are here every day from 8 to 4.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT LINVILLE** - Well, that pretty much covers everything.

**COUNCILMAN PIROS** - Who maintains the calendar notifications on the app?

**MAYOR WOOFER** – Well, that’s a good question. Terri maintains that part of it. We are still having some issues with the app and we have been in communication with them today. It’s not fully operable. But if you want to make sure something gets on the app, give Terri a call.

**FINANCE DIRECTOR’S REPORT:**

**FINANCE DIRECTOR MOYER** – I don’t have anything to report this evening unless there are any questions for myself or my department.

**POLICE CHIEF’S REPORT:**

**POLICE CHIEF ANDREWS** – Just some thanks on the ordinance you had tonight to the Law Director and the Clerk for their help. That was fast tracked. We weren’t expecting to get that done until first reading of next month but because of their work, I was able to get it on quickly.

As the Mayor said, we have a Drug Take Back Program Saturday, April 30<sup>th</sup>. It is the last Saturday of this month from 10 to 2. The same thing we’ve always done. I encourage people to drop off any unused medications. Please no hypodermics, asthma inhalers and/or liquids.

Park Clean Up is set for Saturday, May 7<sup>th</sup> at 9:00 a.m. We will work with parks people, service department, fire department, and anybody who will be there to help clean up the city. Mostly, we will be hitting all the parks systems. If you have church groups or civic groups that are interested. I know the SRO is reaching out to people at the school. The more the merrier. It makes it go a lot quicker. If there is something special you want to see, let myself or Terri know.

**COUNCILMAN MOORE** -Tom, those drugs you take back, how are they disposed of?

**POLICE CHIEF ANDREWS** – The BCI and DEA combined usually come in and pick them up on Monday. We take them throughout the year. We store them in evidence. We have boxes that we use. I am very surprised. When we first started this program, I thought well that’s a good thing to do. We probably take in 6 to 7 visits a week of people who drop off drugs consistently. It’s amazing.

**COUNCILMAN MOORE** -You really don’t want them flushed because it gets in the water.

**POLICE CHIEF ANDREWS** – Right. And a lot of people know that but there are some that say I don’t know what to do. They see that and it’s a lot more advantageous. A lot of places have drug drop off boxes and things like that. We thought about that but it won’t really work for us. It’s just easier for them to come in and give them to either Marcia or one of the officers. We will put them in the evidence room and hang on to them until we get a program like this and accumulate them all. They come in and take the boxes away. It works out good.

I’ve been in touch with the Soap Box Derby people. They finally did what I wanted them to do which was make sure they talked to the Ag Center mostly to make sure nothing was going on at that time. The County Engineers will get the sign on the other end of the road to say the road is going to be blocked off. We will take care of the rest with the Service Depts help to get the barricades out and all that good stuff. They are looking at June 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup>. The race is Saturday the 4<sup>th</sup>. That’s usually when they run. They set up on Friday night.

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They will use Sunday if Saturday is a rain day. I sent letters out to everyone on Main St that would be affected to give them a heads up. I did that last year too and the year before. It seems to work out good. I never had anybody yet say no we don't want it done. They work pretty good with all the residents down in through there. We will have more on that as we get closer on the city page and the Police Facebook page too. Other than that, you have my monthly and I'll answer any questions you have of us.

**FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT:**

**FIRE CHIEF REA** - Thank you for your continued support of the legislation I have on. Next month, I will be bringing another one for the women's restroom. We are going to renovate that to match the men's. I know I have been quiet for two years and didn't do much legislation, and it seems like shock and awe, but I'll quiet down after this. It's budgeted for. The Training Center is going to help fund it since they were in part responsible for use for the past 17 years.

We are giving an entrance exam for Firefighters on Friday, May 13th. All parties interested have come up or they can stop here at city hall and get an application. Hopefully, we will be having that exam and possibly filling one slot in the coming year. We have to wait and see. That's about it. You have my monthly report. I'd be happy to answer any questions.

**DAVE CADWALLADER – 231 FOX RUN**

**DAVE CADWALLADER** – I get multiple phone calls from various organizations such as the Fraternal Firemen's Organization that helps firemen that were injured. I was on the Bristol Fire Dept for over 12 years. Many of these organizations I've never heard of. There are warnings from the Ohio Attorney General's Office that these are scams. Is there any way you can put out some of these things or at least put it in the paper or something so the people can watch out for these things. These are scams that are not authorized. I get the same thing from the Highway Patrol and I got a highway patrolman that lives up my street and he says to forget them. They are all just after the money.

**FIRE CHIEF REA** – Yes, that's all they are. We do no phone solicitations. The union has not gone to phone soliciting in Cortland. There are some in the area that do it, but Cortland has not gone to any phone solicitations for fundraisers. We can put out a little thing, especially on our Facebook page, that they are not condoned or sponsored by us.

**DAVE CADWALLADER** – I think that would be good. My mother used to get caught up with all of these. She would say, Oh they help the firemen or they help the police. And then it would come out from the Attorney General's that they are all scams.

**FIRE CHIEF REA** – It's easy pickings sometimes because they don't know. They want to help the police and they want to help the firemen.

**COUNCILWOMAN KELLER** - Are you on the Do Not Call List?

**DAVE CADWALLADER** – No.

**COUNCILWOMAN KELLER** - Does that work? Does anyone know? I don't have a home phone so I don't know.

**(MULTIPLE CONVERSATIONS)**

**COUNCILMAN PIROS** - Now they have cell phones.

**COUNCILWOMAN KELLER** - You can do Do Not Call on your phone cells. I did that.

**DAVE CADWALLADER** – That Do Not Call List does not stop them because they are considered a charity.

**COUNCILMAN MOORE** –The Cortland Police has their own campaign, right?

**POLICE CHIEF ANDREWS** – Well the fraternal police do, yes. We do that once a year and we usually put out all kinds of publication that it's going on. Plus, we encourage people to call regardless; still call. A lot of times we have instances where the criminals find out we are doing it and they'll decide to use our tag line and then go pick up the check. We'll have them mail it in or drop it off up here.

**COUNCILMAN MOORE** –Is that all used in Cortland?

**POLICE CHIEF ANDREWS** – Cortland and Bazetta are a joint FOP.

**SERVICE DIRECTOR'S REPORT:**

**SERVICE DIRECTOR WITTMAN** – It was a bizarre Monday. A lot of different things going on that happened over the weekend as far as our water system. Typical problems we are working through. I'll apprise people if it becomes too much of an expenditure. One of the things that did come out of the nice warm weather is we are getting a lot of zoning complaints. People are calling into city hall. I just want to remind everyone that zoning complaints will be fielded when in writing submitted to the city. So, blatant things such as not getting a fence permit or a not getting a permit for construction, we will go out and attack those but as far as recognizing a businesses operating out of their home and things like that, we rely on residents to call. There is a zoning code investigation procedure on the website. It is clearly spells out who, what, where, when and how.

**COUNCILMAN MOORE** – There is a requirement for a Garage Sale Permit, right?

**SERVICE DIRECTOR WITTMAN** - That would be a business regulation that falls outside of my department.

**COUNCILMAN MOORE** – But the city does have a requirement? Is that well known out there? Are people aware of it? This time of year we have a lot of garage sales.

**MAYOR WOOFER** - Somebody asked that earlier.

**FINANCE DIRECTOR MOYER** - We issue a lot of permits every year. I can tell you that. We started to issue you them already this year.

**MAYOR WOOFER** - We could probably put something on the website.

**COUNCILWOMAN KELLER** - I think there is something on the website.

**CLERK OF COUNCIL HORN** - There is. The garage sale information is under "Bulletins" on the city's website.

**NO COMMITTEE REPORTS**

**QUESTIONS OF COUNCIL FROM THE AUDIENCE:**

**DAVE CADWALLADER – 231 FOX RUN**

**DAVE CADWALLADER** - I have my pet peeve people that I've looked up. In August, it's coming up; the contract for trash pick-up is up. Here are some of the problems I've run into in the ten years I've lived in this city. First, vacations. I called a number of times to see about having mine stopped for a week when we were on vacation. I've been told each time they do not stop for a week. You must stop for a minimum of 4 weeks. Every time I've call I get the same answer. It's not right. They simply won't do it. I'm sorry, but my wife when she was working could only take her vacation one week at a time unless she was going to Europe or something like that. So, it didn't set out and they still collected the money. Second, answering phones on Friday. I put my trash out on Thursday night; it gets picked up on Friday. But it seems like they shut their phones off at 3:00 in the afternoon. There's been at least a dozen times, or at least in one day, I've tried to call after 3:00 and it rings and it rings and nobody answers. Many people don't get home until after 3:00 on Friday. What happens then, if they haven't picked it up you put it away. Then you can't call them until Monday. Even when I have gotten a hold of them before 3:00 on a Friday they were nasty. One time I called on a Friday and I said you did not pick up my, I think it was the recycling that time. They said we'll get it. Well, nobody ever showed. So, the next time that happened I called him every couple hours. The one guy got nasty and said I said I'd pick it up. The last time that was said to me nobody showed. Well, a guy did finally show up. Next, the contract. I asked the city about the contract so the lady out here emailed me a copy. I read through it. We need information as to what we can put in your trash. In 10 years, I've received one little pamphlet and it's the one that said you're not allowed to put construction waste in there. It was news to me because we tore out a closet and I broke up the drywall and put it in bags and they ended up taking it. Now I find out you are not supposed to do that. The only time I've received something was when they said they are now taking light cardboard such as cereal box cardboard. Anything heavier than that needed to be taken to Willow Park and put into the big dumpsters there. There was no information on that. When I started, all they were worried about was what I was doing and how much I owed. The lack of information from them is tremendous. To my next item, recycling, as to what you can put into your recycling bins. I try to put in only what can be recycled and I've been somewhat educated in that; but my wife has not. I cannot get it through to her, because there is nothing to show to her about it, that you can't take every bit of scrap that you've got and stuff it into that cereal box and throw it in there and it will be recycled. I know the people at the end, when they are actually separating this stuff, if a box comes down like that it goes right off into the landfill bin because they don't have time to pull these things apart and put them where they are supposed to. Other things such as broken glass. They cannot take broken glass in the recycling. They cannot take leaded glass in the recycling. They cannot take waxed paper such as milk cartons and orange juice containers and so on in there because it screws up the paper recycling system. I was told there is one in Bazetta Township. They will take that. But that's a different company. I think that's about it. But some of this needs to be put into the contract. This is information they need to put out to the people. Now, I've got friends in other cities, especially in the City of Columbus, they get lots of information from their people as to what can be put into the recycling. Actually, they put out a little pamphlet once with pictures of the final conveyor belt where they are throwing

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plastic this way and paper that way and glass the other way and so on. They educated the people as to what you can put in there. I am sure there is a ton of junk put in there that can't be recycled. I know my wife is responsible for quite a bit at my house. I keep trying to tell her and she doesn't get it. If we had something she could sit down and read I think it would be a lot better.

**MAYOR WOOFER** – Dave, the Service Director and myself will be meeting with the garbage people on the 28<sup>th</sup> of this month. We will certainly convey your concerns to them and see if there is anything we can do to resolve this.

**DAVE CADWALLADER** - All I wanted was to bring it up to your attention to see if you can't do a little something here. I think some information to the public again whether its drugs or get some information to them about the scams that are going on. A lot of people won't pay attention, but a lot of people will.

**MAYOR WOOFER** – Thank you.

**COUNCILMAN PIROS** - Don, the construction, that's one of the things they can pick up during the spring clean-up. Is it not?

**SERVICE DIRECTOR WITTMAN** - Correct.

**COUNCILMAN PIROS** - And the Fall Clean-Up too?

**SERVICE DIRECTOR WITTMAN** - Correct. I think if you do break up construction debris, I don't think they just want like an entire can full of drywall and things like that left off to the side. Technically, that's supposed to go to a construction demolition debris landfill, I do believe. However, depending on how much trash you use, I know they do have a pay as you throw program which would be helpful on vacations as far as the spending one week. I don't know if that is possible. The pamphlet of items they take both recycled and those materials are on-line and we have been publishing that in conjunction with our spring clean-up.

**DAVE CADWALLADER** - Well, mine was just a little closet and it was a certain amount of drywall. I broke it all up and stuffed it into a bag. When I read it in the contract, I thought, well I did something I wasn't supposed to do. I could have found another way to get rid of it.

**MAYOR WOOFER** - Dave, our Clerk of Council will give you a pamphlet after the meeting. Maybe it's the same one you have, I don't know. It's also on our website. She will fix you up with that. Thank you.

**DAVE CADWALLADER** - It would be nice if the trash company mailed this information out to the people. That way they know everyone is going to get it. They could put it into the bills but a lot of people don't read through their bills.
