

REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING – 7:00 P.M.

The Council of the City of Cortland met in regular session on Monday, August 6, 2018 at 7:00 p.m. at the City Administration Building, 400 N High St, Cortland, Ohio with Council President Deidre Petrosky presiding. Members of Council present were James Edwards, Kathy Fleischer, Patti Keller, Don Moore, Kevin Piros and Scott Rowley. Also present at the meeting were Mayor Woofter, Law Director Wilson, Finance Director Gibson, Police Chief Morris, Fire Chief Rea, Service Director Wittman and Clerk of Council Horn.

A motion to approve Council Minutes from the July 16, 2018 Regular Council Meeting was made by Councilman Moore and seconded by Councilman Edwards. **ROLL CALL** - Edwards, aye; Fleischer, aye; Keller, aye; Moore, aye; Petrosky, aye; Piros, aye; Rowley, aye. **MOTION PASSED**

A motion to approve Schedule of Bills to be paid totaling \$139,829.05 was made by Councilman Piros and seconded by Councilwoman Fleischer. **ROLL CALL** - Edwards, aye; Fleischer, aye; Keller, aye; Moore, aye; Petrosky, aye; Piros, aye; Rowley, aye. **MOTION PASSED**

OLD BUSINESS:

Republic Services of Youngstown for the removal of refuse from the City of Cortland, Ohio was read and moved for second reading by Councilman Rowley and seconded by Councilman Piros. **ROLL CALL ON O-26-18** - Edwards, aye; Fleischer, aye; Keller, aye; Moore, aye; Petrosky, aye; Piros, aye; Rowley, aye. **ORDINANCE PASSED SECOND READING**

MAYOR WOOFTER – I want to say, just to be perfectly clear, I heard some scuttlebutt on social media somewhere. The Browning Ferris is a one year extension. There is no increase in fees.

NEW BUSINESS:

RESOLUTION R-26-18 – A Resolution in support of establishing a Super Hero Parking Program for the City of Cortland was read and moved by Councilman Moore and seconded by Councilman Piros.

MAYOR WOOFER - So, this came out of the Planning and Zoning Commission. It was Jim Bradley's idea and I would like to let Jim speak to it.

JIM BRADLEY – 144 BEECHWOOD

JIM BRADLEY – Thank you for putting this on your agenda. It's an idea I had with my family. Actually, me and my buddies were sitting around and there was a firefighter, two police officers, a state trooper and my dad. I'm like; I need to do something for these people. So, I started looking to see what I could do. This started down in Florida; it got traction. I don't know if anyone does it in Ohio but we can be the first ones to have this parking. It's called superhero parking. It is parking for veterans, active duty reservists and first responders. It's not enforceable. Our police do not need to enforce it. It's just the honor system. But if we can put it in a park or at City Hall, I think a lot of people will like this. The idea is, once people see what it is I can meet with business owners in town and get them to sponsor a sign. That cost would be the sign and installation. No cost to city hall at all. I see it as all positives, I don't see it a negative. It's not hurting anybody; it's not taking parking spots away because these people are already parking in these spots. It's not eliminating any type of parking spots. I was very thankful that our Zoning Board liked it. With Curt and Mayor Woofter we were able to move it on and put it in front of you so I hope you embrace it as well. Like I said, it's minimal work. I'm going to take on all the work to make sure it's done correctly. I think it will be great for our city and I'm sure the news will catch on. People will feel really good when they use these spots and it will start conversations. I have a 12 year old son and a 9 year old son. In talking about it at home, they are asking questions like what is this, why can granddad park here. It's all good. It really opened up a lot of dialogue in the house too. So, hopefully you guys see it as that. I don't know if you have a packet, but it was a rough draft when I first started. There are parts in here where it talks about having the city do installs but I've really scrapped all of that. After we do something out at the park, like I said, we will take a private. Patrick brought up that idea which is great. Our city services really don't have to do anything with this at all. Hopefully, you guys will embrace it and approve it so we can get started.

MAYOR WOOFER - Most likely, once you have signs made for our parks, wherever we designate to have them, our service people will erect them.

JIM BRADLEY – Sure, for the three that are going to be in a park or...

MAYOR WOOFER - Yeah, anywhere on city property. Anywhere off city property will be up to the business owner.

JIM BRADLEY – That's right. Then, that business owner, if they elect to do it, can use it for their own marketing as well.

MAYOR WOOFER - Right.

COUNCILMAN MOORE - This is not reducing the amount of handicap spaces, right? This is one of the non-handicap spaces that will be designated.

JIM BRADLEY – That’s right. It will be a non-handicap space. Say a business wanted to do it. They can choose any spot they want. It doesn’t have to be close to the door. It can be anywhere for that. That’s the way to pitch it. You’re not losing a spot because these people are shopping at your place all the time anyway. It’s just something to make them feel good and something that will make our city stand out too.

COUNCILMAN MOORE - When I first saw this, it looked like the city would be installing them on private property but that’s not going to be the case.

MAYOR WOOFER - That is not the case at all.

COUNCILMAN MOORE – Even if they were reimbursing us or paying for it, I figured legally you can’t do that.

MAYOR WOOFER – No. Our people will not be doing it. We will probably have one or two up here at City Hall and at least one in each of the parks.

COUNCILMAN MOORE - If someone wanted to do it privately, there would be a charge for that? They would have to get someone to do it or maybe one of the service organizations would do it or something?

COUNCILWOMAN KELLER - Why would there be a charge?

MAYOR WOOFER – Well there would be a charge to have the sign made.

COUNCILMAN MOORE – Right, but I’m saying in terms of installing it. Would it be Lions Club or Rotary? Someone may want to jump in on that and do that rather than hire a private contractor to do it, I suppose. I don’t know. I think that would be possible.

MAYOR WOOFER – Yes, absolutely.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY - Jim, I think this is an excellent idea.

JIM BRADLEY – Thank you.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY - I also want to let you know that yes, we did receive your packet and this is very well put together. So, I thank you for that.

ROLL CALL - Edwards, aye; Fleischer, aye; Keller, aye; Moore, aye; Petrosky, aye; Piros, aye; Rowley, aye. **MOTION PASSED**

RESOLUTION R-28-18 - A Resolution requesting the Auditor of Trumbull County, State of Ohio, to advance the amount of \$200,000 collected thru real estate tax, August settlement for use in the Police Fund of the City of Cortland, Ohio was read and moved by Councilman Piros and seconded by Councilman Rowley. **ROLL CALL** - Edwards, aye; Fleischer, aye; Keller, aye; Moore, aye; Petrosky, aye; Piros, aye; Rowley, aye. **MOTION PASSED**

RESOLUTION R-29-18 - A Resolution requesting the Auditor of Trumbull County, State of Ohio, to advance the amount of \$200,000 collected thru real estate tax, August settlement for use in the Fire Fund of the City of Cortland, Ohio was read and moved by Councilwoman Keller and seconded by Councilwoman Fleischer.

COUNCILMAN MOORE – Patti, I know all three of these, we’ve done this before. It’s pretty much standard?

FINANCE DIRECTOR GIBSON - Standard... every year.

COUNCILMAN MOORE – Nothing out of the ordinary? The amounts are the same as we have done in the past?

FINANCE DIRECTOR GIBSON - The same as we have done before.

ROLL CALL - Edwards, aye; Fleischer, aye; Keller, aye; Moore, aye; Petrosky, aye; Piros, aye; Rowley, aye. **MOTION PASSED**

RESOLUTION R-30-18 - A Resolution accepting the Alternative Tax Budget authorized by the Trumbull County Budget Commission and certifying it to the Trumbull County Auditor was read and moved by Councilman Moore and seconded by Councilman Piros. **ROLL CALL** - Edwards, aye; Fleischer, aye; Keller, aye; Moore, aye; Petrosky, aye; Piros, aye; Rowley, aye. **MOTION PASSED**

RESOLUTION R-31-18 – A Resolution supporting the City of Cortland to apply for Federal Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) funds programmed by the Eastgate Regional Council of

Governments to improve North and South High Street and a portion of East and West Main Street was read and moved by Councilman Rowley and seconded by Councilwoman Fleischer.

SERVICE DIRECTOR WITTMAN - Just a few comments. You have the letter requesting the funds that I wrote to Eastgate. If you look down in the section, this is being programmed out in FY 2023 and 2024. They are opening up the application process at this time for those years. That would be when North and South High St in downtown would be scheduled for resurfacing so don't jump to the conclusions that we are applying for funds to resurface the road we just did. That's just the timing of the matter. They program them out several years in advance.

ROLL CALL - Edwards, aye; Fleischer, aye; Keller, aye; Moore, aye; Petrosky, aye; Piros, aye; Rowley, aye. **MOTION PASSED**

ORDINANCE O-28-18 – An Ordinance authorizing the City of Cortland to replace the municipal sign located at the Administration Building, 400 North High Street was read and moved for first reading by Councilman Piros and seconded by Councilman Rowley.

MAYOR WOOFER - So, it's back again. It's back again at a lesser price. It's \$1,000 or more less money than it was before. The low and best bid came from our Marks Signs right here in Cortland. Previously, the sign maker was from out-of-town. Mark is here this evening to answer any questions of council.

MARK BROWN OF MARKS SIGNS– 301 SOUTH HIGH

MARK BROWN – Any questions?

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY - I have questions. Let me start off. I am not familiar with sign lingo. What is this made out of?

MARK BROWN – A high density foam, the blue part. The city logo will be digitally printed on a piece of aluminum.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY - So, with that type of material what kind of longevity are we looking at?

MARK BROWN – Well, I'm going to say about 30 years or so.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY – Really? Okay, great. Is the brick color going to be a like a gray?

MARK BROWN – I brought the book. Do you want to see it?

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY – Yes, if you don't mind.

(PASSES BOOK AROUND)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY - Oh, that's pretty. Nice. I don't have any more questions for you but I do have one for you. Lighting. Are we doing anything for lighting?

MAYOR WOOFER - Well, whatever lighting we have out there now, which is indirect ground lighting, will be the same. There won't be additional lighting added to that.

COUNCILMAN MOORE – Will it be in the same location as the current sign?

MAYOR WOOFER - Yes.

COUNCILWOMAN FLEISCHER – Same size?

COUNCILMAN MOORE – Obviously, it's a two sided sign?

MAYOR WOOFER - Two sided.

COUNCILMAN MOORE – How is the logo and everything put on? Is it a decal?

MARK BROWN - Digitally printed on a piece of aluminum. The bottom half would be sandblasted and painted.

MAYOR WOOFER - As an example, have you seen the Cortland Healthcare, Sabre, sign across the street?

COUNCILMAN MOORE – Yes.

MAYOR WOOFER – It has raised lettering. When you look at the sign across the street, and I invite you to pull in and look at it, it will be made just like that. You will see a dimensional look to the blue part of the sign and then the administration and police dept lettering portion will be raised.

COUNCILMAN MOORE – Raised off the sign?

MAYOR WOOFER – Right, so it will be dimensional. The city logo will be put on aluminum and then adhered to the...

COUNCILMAN MOORE – It would be separate.

MAYOR WOOFER – Yes.

COUNCILMAN MOORE – This is the color blue you are looking at?

MAYOR WOOFER - Oh, whatever you guys pick out. We will pick out the blue here in the offices.

MARK BROWN – I tried to the get masonry guy here but he had to be in the house at 6:30.

COUNCILMAN PIROS – The logo and everything should not fade over time?

MARK BROWN –No.

COUNCILMAN MOORE – The timing on this is what, Jim? When will it be done?

MAYOR WOOFER – Well, before the end of the year, hopefully.

COUNCILMAN MOORE – So there is a time lag already to do it.

MAYOR WOOFER - It has to go through 3 readings here and then once it goes through 3 readings and hopefully it will be approved then he can start to move on the construction of it. You think the construction time would be...?

MARK BROWN – As far as I can tell it's the masonry guy. He said he is 3 to 4 weeks backed up now.

COUNCILMAN MOORE – You referenced there were 2 other quotes? Were they for similar construction?

MAYOR WOOFER - I don't have them here in front of me. I'd be glad to show them to you afterwards. It was 2 or 3 other signed quotes all for \$2,000 to \$3,000 more, similar to this construction of cement block with stone facing.

COUNCILMAN PIROS – Plus, it's a local person willing to bid.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY - Thank you very much.

MARK BROWN – You're welcome.

ROLL CALL ON O-28-18 - Edwards, aye; Fleischer, aye; Keller, aye; Moore, aye; Petrosky, aye; Piros, aye; Rowley, aye. **ORDINANCE PASSED FIRST READING**

REPORTS:

FINANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT:

FINANCE DIRECTOR GIBSON – Thank you for the support of the resolutions that were on the agenda. I will be happy to answer any questions you have.

POLICE CHIEF'S REPORT:

POLICE CHIEF MORRIS – I don't have anything for you. I do want to say thank you for your efforts on behalf of public safety. We appreciate your support.

JIM BRADLEY – You're welcome.

POLICE CHIEF MORRIS – And also thank you to council for supporting his project. I'll answer any questions that you have.

FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT:

FIRE CHIEF REA – As you can see in front of you, I put a packet at each one of your places. I talked to the Safety Committee and the Mayor when this went down and the Finance Committee tonight. I wasn't dodging any of you intentionally. I spent the last week and today gathering all the information I could so I could present something to you tonight. On Friday, July 27th, our 2nd ambulance, our older 2010 ambulance, the motor went in it. We thought it was going to be a quick fix but when they got it down to the diesel mechanic it was a new motor as well as labor. For the new motor it is \$10,000 and another \$4,000 in labor. That's the best cost because once you start taking stuff out of a 8 year old ambulance you never know what is going to go bad, or break, or need replacements parts. So \$14,000 is best case. More realistic is probably \$20,000 to \$30,000. It is not something I want to do to an 8 year old squad. Not to mention, we are going to put the same 60 diesel motor back in the unit, same type. So, we are getting a motor that will maybe run good for 5 years and then have all kinds of problems with it just like we did the last two we had. I'm a little disappointed we only got 80,000 miles out of a diesel motor. That's not why you buy a diesel. I sat down with Patti over the past week, we ran numbers, we looked at different ways to go about this to get a 2nd ambulance in here and it came down to we have the money to buy in our capital improvement funds, an ambulance. Fortunately, we finished the paperwork and got the USDA loan because we can ride that out. It has the best interest rate over all the banks in the area and it still has no payment fees for early payoff. So, I truly recommend that. We looked at purchasing a new ambulance as soon as we can and paying for it. We will still have about 2 years worth of money in the capital fund to pay our USDA loan over the next 2 years.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY – I have a question. If we purchase a new one, will the new one also have the same motor?

FIRE CHIEF REA – Nope. Most ambulances, whether it is private or public, are getting away from this 60 motor as quickly as they can.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY - I understand why.

FIRE CHIEF REA – Ford, within a couple years, replaced it with a 64 and now they are in the 67. They don't even like them. It was the new emissions standards that came out at the time and no one really knew what was going to happen. They didn't build a reliable product. This one will be a new gas engine like the one we just purchased last year.

COUNCILWOMAN FLEISCHER - What are we doing in the meantime since that one is out of commission?

FIRE CHIEF REA – We have borrowed Mecca's second unit. Part of the contract that we signed last year says we have access to their second unit in times of need and we are in times of need right now. The build time on this is 150 days. That's an expedited build time because when you order one you can expect 9 months to a year. They are willing to get us in and out around 150 days.

MAYOR WOOFER - Chief, tell council have often you have used the 2nd ambulance.

FIRE CHIEF REA – Today we used the 2nd ambulance 3 times. In the past week we probably used it another 5 or more times.

COUNCILWOMAN FLEISCHER - Are we going to be able to have access to Mecca for the whole 150 days?

FIRE CHIEF REA – Yes. I talked to their Chief. The reason being is that we are providing them ambulance support. It not only benefits us, it benefits them. They need us to be there with an ambulance as much as we need that ambulance for our own use.

MAYOR WOOFER – As he alluded to, we have a contract with Mecca...

COUNCILWOMAN FLEISCHER - Right.

MAYOR WOOFER – ... to provide that. We are getting paid for that time as well.

FIRE CHIEF REA – I'd like to proceed because the pricing I gave you is an estimate. It still has to go to the factory. The factory will take our specs and price it out. That's going to take some time. I will be bringing this back to you in emergency format so we don't have to go another month and a half on top of that 150 days. My plan was to buy another one in 2 to 3 years so I have 5 years between units but the best laid plans....

COUNCILMAN MOORE – We are down to one ambulance right now?

FIRE CHIEF REA – Of ours, yes, and then Mecca’s.

COUNCILMAN MOORE – Could the mutual aid requirement pull it out of the city and we would be uncovered?

FIRE CHIEF REA – No. We have two ambulances sitting there. One of ours and one of theirs. And yes, both of them could end up in Mecca under the contract. I can’t tell you when we are going to run calls here and run calls there. It’s the nature of the beast. We have two but one is a 12 year old ambulance from Mecca.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY - Does anyone have any more questions for the Fire Chief?

FIRE CHIEF REA – Oh, I got more. That was just a starter.

(LAUGHTER)

FIRE CHIEF REA – My guys are looking at doing Fill the Boot on Friday, August 24th. It will be the Howland football game here at home. All proceeds, every penny, goes to MDA. We will be downtown just before the game from 4 to 7 p.m. We didn’t get it the last 2 years. We had problems getting enough people to man it. Hopefully we will be able to get it off and get it taken care of this year.

MAYOR WOOFER – That will be down at the main intersection?

FIRE CHIEF REA – Yes, right in front of Rite Aid and the intersection.

On to better news. I got a Bureau of Workers Comp grant this past week - \$9,818. Our portion of that \$9,000 grant is \$1,634 so OBWC is giving us \$8,000 to buy hoods and gloves. It’s part of cancer prevention for firefighters. These will be filtered hoods and structural firefighting gloves so when they go out they can wash their gloves and hopefully get most of the toxins out. They will have a fresh pair of gloves to go on their hands.

Cortland Moose gave us \$390 towards our cot project. We’d like to thank Cortland Moose for their support. We are at about \$4,000 left for funding. I will look in September to purchase a cot. With the Bureau of Workers Comp grant we got for our last cot we paid \$7,000. So, between the state grant, the remainder of the OBWC grant and our donations we are a little over \$4,000. It’s better than last time.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY - Excellent.

FIRE CHIEF REA – But there is a price increase after this September so I don’t want to get \$390 and spend \$390.

Lastly, MARCS grant. I will be bringing legislation to you to apply with other departments through the Trumbull County Fire Chiefs to get MARCS radios. Chief Morris is in the same boat. We

are going to have to switch to MARCS. If any of you have seen the recent news articles out of Trumbull County 911, they are gearing up to MARCS by the end of year, beginning of next year. This will be next year's FEMA grant we are going to go after as a group. Generally, you have better luck as a group. If we are looking at just my department, to do all the vehicles and get portables it will probably be \$40,000 or \$50,000. So, if FEMA is willing to pay 90% of that, I'm willing to take their money. But it's no guarantee. I will be applying and what is required is a Memorandum of Understanding by council that if we are awarded a grant we will participate in it.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY - You will be bringing that to the next meeting?

FIRE CHIEF REA – No. The Trumbull County Fire Chiefs are meeting on the 10th with the grant writer. He is going to give us the paperwork that he needs and we will get an idea of how much his fees will be. Then we will proceed from there. It will be pretty soon because grants open in September. Now I'm done. Any questions?

COUNCILMAN PIROS - The cot that is in the defunct ambulance, will it move over to the new one?

FIRE CHIEF REA – Yes. We have one power cot that gets switched between the two squads. Under the USDA loan, I had a power load power that got put in the new squad. The power load from the old squad will go into the new squad. We do not have that cost to incur; we just have the cost to install it in there which hopefully will be part of our new ambulance. They will install it the factory.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY - Congratulations on your grants and your fundraising. You are doing an excellent job.

SERVICE DIRECTOR'S REPORT:

SERVICE DIRECTOR WITTMAN – I have nothing to report this evening but will entertain any questions that council may have for me.

COUNCILMAN PIROS – Don, I do have a question. As we move forward with applying for the grant for 2023, are we going to possibly introduce bike lanes on some of the major roads? Is that a potential we could think about doing?

SERVICE DIRECTOR WITTMAN –I don't think that has been discussed or looked at. I can talk to Eastgate and see their input on that; but I think mainly with those federally aid routes, especially through the downtown area, or down through North/South High Street, essentially that commercial area would be a very good fit for bicycles and vehicles.

COUNCILMAN PIROS – Just something to think about as we move forward.

MAYOR'S REPORT

MAYOR WOOFER – I have a few announcements:

New Lakeview K-8 School Tour – for city officials, department heads, elected officials and council will be Wednesday, August 8th at 10:00 a.m. Wear closed toe shoes, leather type shoes and long pants.

COUNCILMAN MOORE – Jim, I have a question still on the sign. I forgot to ask you before. I remember us talking about this last year. We are taking off the meeting notices section of that. The thought was now with the city website and everything we don't need...

MAYOR WOOFER – City website, the eNews, publications and various newspapers.

COUNCILMAN MOORE – I remember that discussion. We felt it wasn't needed anymore to put it out there. Plus, someone has to take their time to go out there to do the sign in all kinds of weather.

MAYOR WOOFER – That's true.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

FINANCE COMMITTEE

COUNCILMAN PIROS, CHAIR – The Finance Committee met earlier with the fire and police to discuss capital improvements. The Fire Chief talked about the ambulance.

QUESTIONS OF COUNCIL FROM AUDIENCE:

RANDY ANTILL ~ 190 WALL DR

RANDY ANTILL – I notice a lot of skunk activity in the City of Cortland. Is there anything that can be done about it?

POLICE CHIEF MORRIS - If it's on your property you can contact a private trapper. That's the only thing I would be aware of. I would agree when I was on midnight turns...

RANDY ANTILL – The town stinks.

POLICE CHIEF MORRIS - ... it was everywhere.

RANDY ANTILL – Thank you.

POLICE CHIEF MORRIS - That was my greatest fear. (INAUDIBLE) ... a skunk.

RANDY ANTILL – If we don't address it, they are like cats. They have litters, two or three a year. There will be more of them.

POLICE CHIEF MORRIS - Even around city hall here on midnight turn you would always check around your car before you get in. So, I agree.

RANDY ANTILL – I work for Ohio Edison. I'm out all night long. I drive around town and that's all I smell. My dog has been skunked twice. I know many dogs that have been skunked in town. I realize we can't go trap everything but the parks, we have big wooded areas. At least get a handle on it of some sort before they are a problem. That's all.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY - Thank you for bringing your concerns to our attention.
