The Council of the City of Cortland met in regular session on Monday, July 1, 2019 at 7:00 p.m. at the City Administration Building, 400 N High St, Cortland, Ohio with Council President Deidre Petrosky presiding. Members of Council present were James Edwards, Kathy Fleischer, Patti Keller, Kevin Piros and Scott Rowley; absent was Don Moore. Also present at the meeting were Mayor Woofter, Law Director Wilson, Finance Director Gibson, Police Chief Morris and Clerk of Council Horn; absent were Fire Chief Rea and Service Director Wittman.

NEW BUSINESS:

RESOLUTION R-29-19 - A Resolution authorizing the Mayor of the City of Cortland to proceed with annexing the property known as Permanent Parcel No. 33-075811 and commonly known as the Trumbull County Engineer's Garage was read and moved by Councilman Rowley and seconded by Councilwoman Fleischer.



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MAYOR WOOFER – I will give you a little bit of background information on this. We started looking at this property back when I was President of Council and Curt Moll was Mayor. We've always thought about bringing this property into the City of Cortland to be able to extend our borders. Then, we were approached by Prime Metals, which I believe is a subsidiary of Siemens, to extend water our so they could use city water down that way. They use wells right now and they are limited to the amount of water they are able to generate off their wells. So, that precipitated everything. Moving forward, we talked to Patrick about doing his due diligence to look into what we need to do to annex this property. There are no taxes involved because it is government property. No one is gaining or losing anything financially. We are gaining because we are able to extend our borders which would make it possible then for Prime Metals to get water from the other side of the road if they need it. I talked to each of the Bazetta Township Trustees and they don't really have any issues with it. I also talked to a couple of the Trumbull County Commissioners and they are fine with it as well. Patrick has been working on this the last couple of month and we finally got it to the point where we can put this together and take it to the Trumbull County Commissioners for them to look at and approve.

LAW DIRECTOR WILSON – It's just a shame Chief Rea is not here tonight. He was a big proponent of doing this. He was one of the first to propose it along it with Mayor Woofter and Former Mayor Moll. It will take a while but the process is beginning tonight.

COUNCILMAN PIROS - What about that small two plot that is further up on the same side of Warren Meadville Road? It looks like that's the last little bit that will remain in Bazetta.

MAYOR WOOFER – Are you talking about right here?

COUNCILMAN PIROS - Yes.

MAYOR WOOFER – That's the bowling alley. Unless they would come to us and want to annex.

COUNCILMAN PIROS – We have that going up St Rt 5 where it is so juggernaut (at going up that...

LAW DIRECTOR WILSON – You sound like the county.

MAYOR WOOFER – I totally agree, Kevin, but you can see on the drawing here on Niles Cortland Rd where some things are in the city and some things are not. Unless the property owners want to be annexed, you can't do it. With this government property, we can approach them and say we want to bring that in. Of course there will be a cost, and I don't know exactly what the cost will be to us, but it's not going to be exorbitant, I don't believe.

LAW DIRECTOR WILSON – Right.



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MAYOR WOOFER – On the other hand, if it's an individual property owner, they have to foot the bill. Almost all of it.

COUNCILMAN PIROS – Right.

MAYOR WOOFER – We pay for... What do we pay, Rhonda?

CLERK OF COUNCIL – It depends on the number of pages that we file with the Trumbull County Recorder. It is usually somewhere between \$500 and \$700.

MAYOR WOOFER – That's for the recording of the property and the city always has to pay for that. Hopefully, that answers your question. You can go down and talk to them and see if they want to annex in. I don't know why they wouldn't, really.

COUNCILMAN PIROS – We are going to go right across their property to get the water down there.

MAYOR WOOFER – Right.

ROLL CALL - Edwards, aye; Fleischer, aye; Keller, aye; Moore, absent; Petrosky, aye; Piros, aye; Rowley, aye. **MOTION PASSED**

ORDINANCE O-24-19 - An Ordinance authorizing the Mayor to enter an agreement with Thomas Fok & Associates, Inc. to perform engineering and bidding assistance for the North Mecca Waterline Replacement Project was read and moved for first reading by Councilman Rowley and seconded by Councilwoman Fleischer.

MAYOR WOOFER – In lieu of the fact Don is not here, I think you've known, and especially if you're on the Technical Review Committee, this has been a long time coming. This one of the worst sections of waterline left in the City that needs to be replaced. We are moving forward with this to get the engineering drawings done so we can take it out to bid.

ORDINANCE O-25-19 - An Ordinance authorizing the Mayor to enter an agreement with Thomas Fok & Associates, Inc. to perform construction administration and inspection for the Cedar Drive Waterline Replacement Project was read and moved for first reading by Councilman Piros and seconded by Councilwoman Fleischer.



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MAYOR WOOFER – This is the second worst waterline section in the City of Cortland. As you know, last year, we did a few hundred feet of Cedar Dr with the intent of finishing the rest of the old Cedar Dr sections so that's what this is for this year.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY - Just to clarify. This is not for the construction itself, this is for just the construction administration and inspection. They will be watching out while the construction is being done by another company to make sure all the specifications are being performed correctly.

ORDINANCE O-26-19 - An Ordinance amending the Annual Appropriation Ordinance O-11-19 for the City of Cortland, County of Trumbull, State of Ohio, for Fiscal Year ending on the 31st day of December 2019 was read and moved for first reading by Councilman Rowley and seconded by Councilman Edwards.

FINANCE DIRECTOR GIBSON - This is more of a housekeeping ordinance. As you see, the ones that were added were the three projects - Resurfacing, Cedar and North Mecca. We need to do that because we are getting OPWC funding. We are getting new money so we have to appropriate the money. Even though we won't see that money, it goes straight to the vendor; we still have to show it as in and out on our books. It is normally done at the end of the year and we are going to start doing it as projects go along.

COUNCILMAN PIROS - The ordinance in front of us says it's an emergency but the agenda say it's not. So is it not an emergency?

FINANCE DIRECTOR GIBSON – It's going to be an emergency on the second reading.

COUNCILMAN PIROS - Okay.

FINANCE DIRECTOR GIBSON –That way it's passed prior to the third reading of the other two ordinances.

CLERK OF COUNCIL - We've done that before. Many times, when Fran would pass the budget which was due the end of March, council would pass a first reading and then in emergency at the next meeting.

COUNCILMAN PIROS - Usually either at the beginning or the end of the year, not in the middle.

FINANCE DIRECTOR GIBSON – Not in the middle of the year?



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COUNCILMAN PIROS - Right.

FINANCE DIRECTOR GIBSON – Yes. The money is coming in and I'd rather have it done now then try to cram it all in at the end of the year.

ROLL CALL ON O-26-19 - Edwards, aye; Fleischer, aye; Keller, aye; Moore, absent; Petrosky, aye; Piros, aye; Rowley, aye. **ORDINANCE PASSED FIRST READING**

REPORTS:

FINANCE DEPT REPORT:

FINANCE DIRECTOR GIBSON – I do want to thank you for the ECMSI ordinances. It couldn't have come at a better time. My computer, even though it's new, is really slow. I do need them to look at it. Thank you for that. Other than that, I have nothing to report, but I'd be happy to answer any questions.

POLICE DEPT REPORT:

POLICE CHIEF MORRIS – We are also going to be very happy to have ECMSI. We are on life support, currently.

They came today and encoded our MARCS radios. It sounds like within the next week we will start using those and be able to talk on our radios. That will be nice.

I'm just going to throw this out here right now, because it's probably going to require some review, but we've had some complaints recently about boats, motor homes, trailers and vehicles. Stuff that has been left out. People park them on the roadways and just leave them there. We've got a lot of complaints. Myself, the Mayor and Don have tried to come up with some solutions where you can't park a vehicle there for so many hours. The problem with enforcing that is unless I sit a police car on it for eight hours and the vehicle doesn't move, I can't say that. So, one of the solutions that I'd like to look at, and it's obviously something for you guys to consider, is the overnight parking ban in the city. We would have to come up with how we want to do that, maybe pull some ordinances from other communities. I'm putting it out to you tonight so you can begin to do your research and gather your thoughts on how we resolve this problem. The nice thing about an overnight parking ban is we say from 12 midnight to 4:00 or 5:00 in the morning you can't park your vehicle on the roadway. That way we are not trying to time cars. We are making it forced to get moved and they just can't abandon cars. It's easy because during that timeframe, it's a violation. I would propose some sort of exception in there for driveways being maintenance, getting paved. We will allow you to leave it there. So, come up with some ideas and together as a group we will collectively resolve this. If you have a better idea on these motor homes and boats being in the roadways, please bring it to me

COUNCILMAN ROWLEY - Are you thinking more commercial or all vehicles?



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POLICE CHIEF MORRIS - All vehicles. Some of it is your pleasure boats and motor homes. Some have extra vehicles and they just leave them parked on the road and they never drive them. They get weathered over and it's an eye sore. The residents are upset with us that there is nothing we can do about it. As long as it's legally parked, we cannot find any ordinances that can help us resolve that problem. So, I'm bringing it to you so we can make this a team approach. We are going to make some people happy and anger others. We can do this together. That's my idea or solution. You may have something that's a lot better.

COUNCILWOMAN FLEISCHER - I know Niles has something like that. They have permits for people that especially have short driveways or something like that, or maybe if you are on different shifts and you need to park in the road. They have a permit you can get at the police dept. or the city.

POLICE CHIEF MORRIS - We thought of a permit too if you have a graduation party or something. It would be a specialty permit where it's a limited exception, especially if people pave or tar their driveway. We don't want to stop people from doing that. They are not trying to be a nuisance; they are just working on their driveway. We have to do something for these folks that think the road is a parking lot.

MAYOR WOOFER - The straw that broke the camel's back was we had a resident in the city who parked a 24 foot boat on a trailer out in the front of their house in the street. The only thing we could do was tell them they were parked the wrong direction. Our police dept stopped up there and said you have to turn it around and they did that. I asked John Weston to go back and talk to the people and see if they would get it off the street because the neighbors were complaining about it. When they moved it they put it right in front of somebody else's house. We have no teeth to do anything. We don't have ordinances that allow us to do anything with these types of vehicles. The dangerous thing is if we wanted to send an emergency vehicle down there if someone's home was on fire and this thing is sitting there. How are we going to move this boat?

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY - We're not. We are going to crash right through.

MAYOR WOOFER - It's going to get pushed. So, we've gotten to the point where I've had lengthy conversations with Dave about this. We need to put some thought into creating a new ordinance that will help the police dept resolve this issue.

POLICE CHIEF MORRIS - We want your input as a whole. We don't want to arbitrarily come to you. We want ideas thrown out. We want to think it through and not just rush it.



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COUNCILMAN PIROS – I think it's a good idea to look at other communities so if somebody had a problem they would have challenged it and obviously if it's still on the books it would have been met all the challenges by the objectors.

CLERK OF COUNCIL - I've pulled about 8 or 10 community's night parking ordinances today, Girard, Hubbard, and Warren. I didn't look at Niles, but will. I'm putting it all together so when you all sit down to talk you'll have that information

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY – Thank you.

POLICE CHIEF MORRIS – Other than that, that's all I have.

COUNCILMAN PIROS - How'd the street fair go?

POLICE CHIEF MORRIS – No issues.

COUNCILMAN PIROS - Perfect.

MAYOR'S REPORT:

MAYOR WOOFER – As a reminder, Thursday is the 4th of July. City offices will be closed and trash/recycling collection will be delayed one day this week.

Mosquito Spraying this month will be July 10th and July 24th, weather permitting. If it rains on those days, it will be moved to the next day. If they can't do it that day then it will be cancelled.

Brush Chipping will be the week of July 22nd. Put your brush and limbs out the night before, on Sunday evening. Sometime during that week of the 22nd, our service dept will be around to pick them up and chip them.

The Cortland Garden Club had their Gold Star Marker Dedication on Sunday at the Veterans Park. It went very nice. It was a beautiful day. There was a tent set up full of people. They had attendees there from the State of Ohio Garden Club Association. The Gold Star Plaque that's in the park now was put up last week by the service dept. It is a project through the National Garden Clubs of America. Two individuals from the State of Ohio were there. It was a nice presentation. I thank those who were able to be there. If you haven't seen it, drive by the Veterans Memorial and take a look at it. It's a very nice addition to the park. That's all I have unless there are any questions.



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COUNCILMAN ROWLEY – I'd like to thank the Mayor for his contribution for the plaque.

MAYOR WOOFER – Thank you. You're welcome. I was glad to be part of that project.

NO COMMITTEE REPORTS

COUNCILMAN ROWLEY – Over the weekend, the Cortland Pickleball Association had a tournament. You may have seen some of the little signs around the city. I stopped there on Saturday and there were quite a few people. It was very well attended. There were people there as far away as Pittsburgh, New Castle, Austintown, etc. and a lot of people from Cortland. It's nice to see people coming to the city because of their activities.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY – That's very good. Thank you for stopping and representing us too.

QUESTIONS OF COUNCIL FROM AUDIENCE:

KARI CLARK – 200 TOURNAMENT TRAIL

KARI CLARK – I'm here for myself and my neighbors. This is our board member from Tournament Trail. We have a board member here so he can go help and report back to our association. I'm here to plead and beg for help. We have terrible flooding. I believe the Mayor has a rental unit in Tournament Trail.

MAYOR WOOFER – Not anymore.

KARI CLARK – Not anymore? Did you last year?

MAYOR WOOFER – Yes.

KARI CLARK – I remember your unit.

MAYOR WOOFER – (INAUDIBLE)

KARI CLARK – I thought, yes! He might have some compassion.

KARI CLARK – My husband and I absolutely love living there. We moved in 2007, so we've been there 12 years. I've had six floods since 2011. When we bought the place we were told about the 2004 flooding that all of Cortland had. We came from Champion. We were told that and that was it. We moved in in 2007 and in 2011 was our first flood. It went downhill since. Our last one was June 5th of this year. I have pictures if you want them. I left my phone in the car because I was afraid it would go



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off. It has pictures of the road flooding. That has happened in the last two years and all the years we've lived there we didn't get flooding. My point is it is getting worse and worse every year. These are pictures of the back of our unit. There is water is rushing off of St Rt 5. If it's a light rain, we still get a ton of water. If it's a heavy rain, the whole yard is flooded. It's coming in our basement windows and walls. On June 5th, my husband and I had four sub pumps running. I can show paperwork if I need to. We have them maintained and checked every year by Moody Plumbing. We have done everything we can since 2011. We are tapped out money wise and ideas. We have two (INAUDIBLE) crocs in our basement. Our basement is finished. It's a very nice basement with a bar, carpeting; the works. We are over it. We also have a battery back-up. We bought from Home Depot a drop-in that we do when we realize we are in trouble. We did that on June 5th. My husband and I for 30 minutes straight, and our neighbor came to help us, were bucketing to save us or we would have had more. Our neighbor had four inches, I think, at least. Ours wasn't quite as bad. She is older than us. My husband and I are getting older as we live there and I can't see us living there until we are 70 or 80 bucketing up and down the steps outside. Every time this happens, I have a fit and say that's it, let's put a for sale sign up, I want out of here. My husband says this is not going to sell. No one is going to want to buy it. It's getting to the point that everyone on Tournament Trail feels that way in the sense of it's making the whole area look bad. No one is going to want to buy in there. We have so much water problems. We have a new president, but the one at the time said the storm sewers were checked. Now the streets are also flooding and the storm drains are backing up and bubbling. The association has put in, behind our unit and another unit, french drains. I have a picture. They can't hold the water. We have another board meeting coming up to see what we can do more on our end. Now I'm asking if the city would consider Rt 5. There is no ditching or draining in that area at all. You can see where the water is coming from there.

ELAINE HOFIUS – 305 TOURNAMEN TRAIL

ELAINE HOFIUS - It's going over the road and it's comes down Tournament Trail like the Mississippi River.

KARI CLARK – Yes. In our backyards and literally...

LAW DIRECTOR WILSON - We have to keep minutes of the meeting so...

ELAINE HOFIUS - I'm sorry.

LAW DIRECTOR WILSON - No. Feel free to speak when she's finished. Come on up just so we know who is who.

KARI CLARK – It's rushing down onto our roads. I don't have pictures of that but I do on my phone, which I can go get. I took pictures and a video of our street flooded. I have pictures of the police driving through to check on all of us. I have the police car driving through the flood so you can see how high the water is on street and our backyard.



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COUNCILMAN PIROS - So, this is coming off the road? It's not coming from the creek?

KARI CLARK – Off of Rt 5. That's another issue but I wanted to get to this one first. This one is worse because it just started to happen over the last few years and got bad quick. The creek has been a problem. That's this folder full. Mrs. Petrosky helped me from 20011 to 2014. She probably forgot but I have your emails. You were very kind and helped me. That's another story. Our board at that time fell short. We have to deal with that separately, I guess. But Rt 5 is the city, right?

COUNCILMAN PIROS - Well, Rt 5 isn't the city, is it? Rt 5 isn't technically the city. Is it Mecca?

MAYOR WOOFER - No. That was annexed into the city.

COUNCILMAN PIROS - Where that church is?

MAYOR WOOFER - Yes.

KARI CLARK – The unit the Mayor owned a year ago...

MAYOR WOOFER - I actually did not own it a year ago.

KARI CLARK – Well, that unit hasn't flooded since 2004. Our unit floods all the time for some reason and I'm thinking it is because it is coming off... This is Rt 5 and here is our 4-plex condo. It runs into our building. Your old building is down towards the other end and they haven't flooded since 2004 and now they are getting water as well. That whole unit got it last month pretty bad. I don't have the road flooding.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY - I have a couple things to say and Patrick please jump in if I misstate something. The french drains, like you indicated, that's a problem that your board needs to take care of with all the flooding. The Rt 5 flooding is something that's new.

KARI CLARK – It's not new; that's why they put french drains in. The french drains used to work. Now there is so much water, the french drains can't keep up.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY – Here's the problem. The city did a study more than 10 years ago looking at the flooding problem in that area. The study indicated that this is water coming from up north. My guess, and it's only a guess, is there is more land being farmed or there is some drainage up there that gets water that has prior been able to be contained is now coming down now adding to the problem. At that time, and I think it was 2003, when we did this study. It's a northern Trumbull County problem that comes down here. To fix it would cost multi-million dollars. It's something that the



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Trumbull County Commissioners... We would have to work with them or they would have to work with us. It's a way bigger problem than just us trying to handle storm water right here in the city. We would have to create a hug retention basin or something further north.

KARI CLARK – I agree. What you are saying is true and I think that's the creeks problem because that is from up north; but, ours is a different direction. That's what the pictures show you. You can see it coming off Rt 5. That's not north, that would be west, I believe.

ELAINE HOFIUS – 305 TOURNAMENT TRAIL

ELAINE HOFIUS – I am a tax payer. I own 305 Tournament Trail. Part of the issue has always been the creek that has never been addressed. I agree with you; that's a county issue. The county should not be putting anything upstream that negatively impacts our property. As you can see, it just overflows. Part of the problem, I noticed on my neighbors, is the water is not coming from the creek; it is coming over Rt 5. Something has changed. Part of those properties are in Cortland, so those have been annexed in here and are probably causing part of the problem. You can't even see a storm drain along or a ditch that is going to catch the water. As she mentioned, we have those two pipes that come out and water comes out of there but water is still seeking its lowest point. By the 100 unit, which is the first unit on the right hand side, it is roaring down past his garage, around his flower bed and into the road. Unfortunately, we are a private road. So, this drainage that is not coming from the creek, which is coming from the road, is coming down like the Mississippi these last couple of times. It is negatively impacting our road. The \$100,000 worth of taxes we pay to Trumbull County and Cortland we have to fix since it's a private road. We do appreciate our police and firemen. You've been to my house a couple times where someone is sitting on my front porch who I didn't know. I appreciate that. What is happening to her house and her neighbor's connected, is it is roaring down and it is hitting their basement. It seems like it is the lowest part, those three houses that are right before you get to Cortland. Like she said, they have 4 sub pumps and have a hose coming out their front door and it's gushing. The other thing that is going to happen is the black mold. That is so terrible to get rid of. We need someone to look at what is happening on Rt 5. We'd appreciate it. Sorry I'm so winded.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY – You did very well. Unfortunately, the Service Director is not here this evening; but, I'm on the Technical Review Committee as well as a couple other council members and the Mayor. We will discuss at the next Technical Review Committee meeting and see if we can brainstorm and see if we can come up with some ideas of where we can begin.

DAVE CADWALLADER – 231 FOX RUN

DAVE CADWALLADER – My problem isn't anywhere as big as theirs, just a little complaint. Whose job is it to clean up the asphalt that is left behind after they have paved Main St?



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MAYOR WOOFER - That would be the paving company. There are a lot of issues with that so... Where, specifically, are you talking?

DAVE CADWALLADER – I ask all of you to go out on Main St and when you get to Heritage, look at the northeast corner between the sidewalk and the road. There is a pile of asphalt there. Nobody can mow over that asphalt. If you start down Main St and go up and down the street, there is a pile of asphalt on the edge of somebody’s driveway. I walk my dogs down there all the time and I thought they would clean it up when they are all done but it’s still there.

MAYOR WOOFER - We will take a look at it.

DAVE CADWALLADER – Like I said, mine is not a big problem. They have bigger problems. I just wanted to bring it to someone’s attention.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT PETROSKY – Thank you very much.
